Celebrate THE FACTS

Area Information - Stockton is centrally located in Northern California.

Location: Stockton is located about 75 miles east of the San Francisco Bay Area and 40 miles south of Sacramento. Stockton is home to the largest inland seaport in California. Running through and around Stockton are thousands of miles of waterways, canals, and rivers that comprise the California Delta. The Stockton Deep Water Channel runs behind the Stockton Ballpark, Stockton Arena, right into the heart of Downtown.

Population (approximately)

With 290,141 residents, Stockton is the 13th largest city in California.

Climate

The climate for Stockton is temperate, with warm dry days and cool nights in the summer. Winter is usually mild with some light rainfalls during the winter months. Stockton's average annual rainfall is 13.95 inches per year

Transportation

Stockton is strategically located between the Bay Area to the west, the Sierras to the east, Sacramento to the north and Fresno to the south. Getting to these places is easy with a wide variety of transportation.

- [SJRTD](#) (San Joaquin Regional Transit District) is the local transit bus service with routes connecting Stockton with such surrounding cities as: Lodi, Tracy, Tracy Depot, Manteca, Ripon, and Lathrop with connecting services to Sacramento, the Bay Area, and BART (Bay Area Rapid Transit).

Celebrate HISTORY

Stockton was founded in 1849 by a German immigrant, Charles M. Weber, who acquired over 49,000 acres of land through a Spanish land grant. Captain Weber tried his hand at gold mining in late 1848, but by the next spring, realized that the true wealth lay in providing for the rush of gold-seekers from all over the world, and established his town to serve those needs. As J. H. Carson, in his LIFE IN CALIFORNIA described it in 1849: "A rush and whirl of noisy human beings were continually before the eye. The magic wand of gold had been shaken over a desolate place, and on it a vast city had arisen at the bidding."

LANDMARKS AND HISTORIC BUILDINGS

[California State Historic Landmarks Located in Stockton](#)

There are six California State Historic Landmarks in Stockton.

[National Historic Landmarks Located in Stockton](#)

Several buildings in Stockton and San Joaquin County are on the National Register of Historical Landmarks. A couple of gems on the Register include the **Bob Hope (Formerly Fox) Theatre** and the **Hotel Stockton**.

[The Hotel Stockton](#)

The grand, Mission Revival style, 252-room tourist hotel, Hotel Stockton, was completed in 1910. The proposal for the Hotel Stockton was grand and included a six-story edifice designed by architect Edgar Brown. Overall, it is more than 145,000 sq ft. The initial budget was about \$350,000 but was increased to provide a truly first-class hotel. In 1949 director Robert Rossen used The Stockton (as well as Stockton residents as extras) for the film [All the King's Men](#) the film won the Oscar for Best Picture in 1950. The Hotel Stockton has survived at least two fires and two floods slowed its construction. The Hotel Stockton was completely renovated and opened in 2005 with as senior housing. Lobby tours are available and also highlight a mini-exhibit featuring excavated artifacts for the former Chinese Laundry near the site.

[Bob Hope \(Fox\) Theatre](#)

On October 14, 1930 the Fox Theatre opened in one of the most grandiose events in the region. Approximately 20,000 people attended the celebration, including some of the most famous stars of the time. Opening acts included the latest “talkie” movies and comedy skits. The Fox was the largest vaudeville house in California and also one of the safest buildings of the time, built entirely with cement and steel, with the ability to evacuate guests within two minutes. In 2004, with an \$8.5 million renovation complete, the Bob Hope Theatre was restored to its grandeur as when it was built in 1930.

Celebrate FAMILY FUN

Fun Celebrations for the Whole Family

Stockton has many things for families including the [Children’s Museum of Stockton](#), one of the highlights in the Central Valley. Located downtown, across from new Marina, the Children’s Museum is real treasure. Another jewel in downtown is [Pixie Woods Children’s Playland](#). With train rides, a carousel, boat ride and water play features; Pixie Woods is the perfect retreat for the whole family. If you are an animal lover then [Micke Grove Regional Park and Zoo](#) is the place for you. The area has a Japanese Garden, Tea Pavilion, Koi Pond, and Fun Town amusement park.

The [Haggin Museum](#) is one of the most impressive cultural treasures in the Central Valley. Artists such as Albert Bierstadt, Rosa Bonheur, and Jean-Leon Gerome can be found here as well as historical displays from Stockton's past including Stockton's founder Charles Weber; Benjamin Holt, inventor of the Caterpillar track-type tractor; and Tillie Lewis, the "Tomato Queen."

[Oak Grove Regional Park](#) is a wonderful place to spend the day. Located in north Stockton this 180-acre park with beautiful oak-forest setting features several amenities including: a 10 acre lake stocked with catfish and trout as well as paddleboats and aqua cycles; [Oak Grove Nature Center](#); two nature trails (one is handicapped accessible); picnic shelters and the only 18 hole [disc golf](#) course in the area.

If skate boarding is your pleasure, head over to the [Skate Park](#) at Anderson Park on El Dorado between Swain Road and Benjamin Holt Drive. The skate park features: a moon, small bowl, offset steps, half-pipe, rail, EMB, fun box, block, piano, and a star.

[San Joaquin Historical Museum](#) reveals the fascinating history of the region, from the Yokuts and Miwok through Captain Charles Weber, Stockton's founder, and the development of modern agriculture so important to our area.

ON THE WATER

One of the benefits of Stockton's location is the proximity of the [San Joaquin Delta](#). There is never a dull moment with so many possibilities for fun including: boating, fishing, water sports, camping, or just relaxing and the enjoying the warm California sunshine.

Celebrate NEIGHBORHOODS

[DOWNTOWN STOCKTON](#)

Headquarters of both City and County government, Downtown Stockton offers numerous ethnic dining and lively entertainment options. Dine at any one of the more than 30 restaurants in the downtown area, see a musical, theatre performance or classic film at the Bob Hope Theatre or take in one of the many sporting events at the Stockton Arena.

Historically, Downtown Stockton began with a mix of thriving commercial ventures and colorful characters taking advantage of the prime geographic location at the crossroads of California. By the turn of the century, Stockton had grown into an industrial city. Streetcars running down Main Street and the presence of banks, hotels, and theatres, attracted a steady flow of visitors. By the 1930's, Main Street boasted several skyscrapers and became the center of Stockton's leading shops and prominent businesses. Today, with the strong revitalization efforts have brought new life and charm into the heart of Stockton.

DOWNTOWN GEMS

[Weber Point Events Center](#) and its towering sail-like cover and intriguing elements including a brick labyrinth, layout of Charles Weber's home, and waterfront promenade.

[Public Art Walking Tour](#) there are more than 30 individual public art elements in the downtown area including manhole covers, murals, sculptures sidewalk elements, tree grates and tree guards. Keep your eyes open for public art surprises around nearly every corner.

The **Magnolia Historic District**, located in Midtown Stockton, encompasses the richest variety of architectural styles found in the City. Primarily composed of single and multifamily homes, most of the neighborhood was designated, the Magnolia Historic District, by the State of California. The tree-lined streets display samples of virtually all the architectural styles of California's most formative period, including Queen Anne, Eastlake, Craftsman, Moderne, Spanish Revival, and Dutch Colonial. MIRACLE MILE

The [Miracle Mile](#) is a vibrant and pedestrian-friendly place to shop, dine, and explore. It's the local's favorite hangout and has been referred to as "down-to-earth", "pro-culture" and "pro-coolness". The Mile is home to a wide variety of unique and charming shops and some of the best restaurants around for miles. The [Stockton Empire Theatre](#) is a hot spot hosting a wide variety of events from poetry readings and comedy shows to arthouse films, and concerts. The Stockton Art League's Art Gallery, the [Elsie May Goodwin Gallery](#) has wonderful art displays

showcasing the talented artists in Stockton and often host art demonstrations giving insights into how art is made using various techniques.

Celebrate **FESTIVALS and EVENTS**

Stockton is possibly best known for its annual spring [Asparagus Festival](#) held the last weekend each April (April 23-25, 2010). California's largest charitable food festival, the Asparagus Festival has earned the Best of the West Food Fest with over 110,000 people attending the three-day event. Expect beautiful sunny days, live music, celebrity kitchen, recipe contests, kids asparazone, a 5K run, arts and crafts, delta cruises, and much much more.

Taste! of San Joaquin - sponsored by the [Downtown Stockton Alliance](#) is held in July and includes more than 30 food booths from local restaurants. Sampling starts at \$1. 2009 featured a **BBQ Cook-Off** and a **Way Out West BBQ Competition**. To quench your thirst, there is wine & beer tasting from local breweries & wineries. Look for a classic car show in 2010.

The annual [Jewish Food Festival](#), held in June is a wonderful opportunity to learn about the Jewish culture. Browse the Jewish deli & bakery for take-out items, enjoy the bagel making demonstration. This family event includes Temple tours, music, dancing, silent auction, a beer garden and fun & games for the kids.

The **Greek Food Festival** at [St. Basil's Greek Orthodox Church](#) is one not to be missed. Fine Greek cuisine and pasties are available to sample and take home, authentic Greek music and dancing, tours of the incredible church and the impressive mosaics are all worth the low admission price.

Stockton's [Earth Day Festival](#) has a long history of helping people recognize the importance of caring for our earth and natural resources. Through educational programs and fun activities, the Earth Day Festival helps share this vision with thousands of people each year.

[Wine on the Waterfront](#), an elegant evening of wine and gourmet food tasting on the waterfront. A benefit for Big Brothers Big Sisters.

Family Day at the Park is FREE to the public. This only day event each September celebrates literacy. Thousands of families converge into University park for Kids Art Projects, Used Book Sale, Storytelling, Live Music and Food & Fun.

Celebrate CULTURAL ARTS

Stockton has many reasons to celebrate the cultural arts! Art galleries, public art, symphony, and an international film festival are just the beginning.

ART

The [Goodwin Gallery](#), run by the Stockton Art League on the Miracle Mile is a wonderful place to find examples of talented locals. The [Tidewater Art Center and Gallery](#) is a cooperative gallery in the downtown areas. With changing exhibitions every month, there is always something new to see and enjoy at the Tidewater. The [Alan Short Gallery](#) is for adults with developmental disabilities. It features silk scarves, paintings, ceramics, cards, and more. [L.H. Horton Jr. Gallery](#) at San Joaquin Delta College is a premier visual arts exhibition space. The primary mission of the gallery is to promote quality and culturally diversified artwork in support of student's education. [Reynolds Gallery](#) at the University of the Pacific is located in the Jeannette Powel Art Center provides a means to develop perceptual skills, a visual arts language, and an understanding of historical and cultural context of the visual arts. The [Haggin Museum](#) is the crown jewel of cultural institutions in the Central Valley. **Sunset Magazine** referred to the Haggin as "one of the undersung gems of California."

Stockton's [Public Art](#) Program started in 2001 has put nearly 100 pieces of public art in Stockton for everyone to enjoy in just about every part of the City. Major pieces can be seen in the downtown, on Interstate 5, Highway 99, next to schools, on underpasses, street meridians, and the walls of public buildings.

FILM

The [San Joaquin Film Society](#) offers numerous film festivals throughout the year including their flagship, the [San Joaquin International Film Festival](#) in February. Other World Cinema Series film festivals include the **Jewish Film Festival**, **Children's Film Festival**, California Documentary Film Festival, or [CALDOCFEST](#). THEATRE

[Stockton Civic Theatre](#) is a regional showplace for great works of performing art that influence and enhance the lives of all who attend and participate in each performance. In addition to producing six plays a season, SCT conducts a dynamic theatre education program for youth and adults. What community is complete without a children's theatre? [Kudos Children's Theatre Company](#) fills this spot with imagination and joy.

MUSIC

[Stockton Symphony](#) is one of the pre-eminent performing arts organization in San Joaquin County, and the third oldest orchestra in California. The mission of the Stockton Symphony is to engage, educate, and inspire the community through a commitment to excellence in its performances and programs. [Friends of Chamber Music](#) has presented the finest chamber music to the Stockton community for more than 50 years. The [Stockton Choral](#) has both adult and youth organizations, as well as a Master Chorale. The Chorale offers the performance of great masterworks with orchestra and the finest professional and regional soloists. The [Stockton Opera](#) produces a light or grand opera each year. Performances are held at the lovely Faye Spanos Concert Hall and the University of the Pacific (UOP). The [Conservatory of Music at the University of the Pacific](#) offers a range of high quality performances on the beautiful UOP campus. This includes the spectacular [Brubeck Institute](#) and annual Jazz Festival.

THE STATUES OF THE CAMBODIAN BUDDHIST TEMPLE

One of the most unique places to visit in the City of Stockton is the [Cambodian Buddhist Temple](#). Over 25 colorful and larger than life jewel toned statues celebrate the life and story of the Cambodian Buddha. You have to see it to believe it...including the 50 foot long recumbent Buddha. The temple is also home to the annual Cambodian New Year Celebration. Featured in Huell Howser's [Road Trip to Stockton](#).

Next to the Stockton Arena is the 5,300 **Stockton Ballpark**, home of the [Stockton Ports](#), major league affiliate of the Oakland A's.

FISHING

Being located on the San Joaquin Delta has its advantage for those who love to fish. Bass Master Tournaments have been held in Stockton and there are many avid fishing clubs and guides including those devoted to bass fishing, fly fishing, crowdadding and everything in between.

Spring haystack and fall hay tunnels are also fun.
